

I Know the Books of the Old Testament

The Bible is a large and sometimes intimidating book. It tells us, though, that “[God’s] word is a lamp to guide my feet and a light for my path” (Psalm 119:105). The more comfortable children become with Bible mechanics—like the names of the Bible books—the more likely they are to explore its content.

Just as you do, we also want your child to turn to God’s promises for help, to his wisdom in times of uncertainty, and to his truth when he or she is confused.

You can help your child review the names of the Bible books in several ways. For example . . .

- Find a “song to learn Bible books” online.
- Learn 3–5 new books each day, adding to the list of books you already know.
- Recite the books learned at bedtime and breakfast.
- Work with your child to create his or her own unique method.
